# **BEYOND TOLERANCE**

affirming LGBTQ+ singers in the choral context

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## STRATEGIES FOR LGBTQ+ INCLUSION IN CHORAL ENSEMBLES

- △ Normalize sharing pronouns in introductions. This is an easy step that everyone can take to include trans and nonbinary individuals. Model including pronouns when introducing yourself for the first time, and invite your students to do the same.
- Δ Choose performance attire that supports a diversity of gender expression. Mandating clothing that is specifically gendered (i.e. gowns and tuxedos) will alienate trans and nonbinary singers, and can often be inaccessible for low-income students, when not distributed and maintained by the choral program.
- Δ Find and program repertoire that represents all people. Choose repertoire that uses gender-neutral language so that all singers can see themselves reflected in the music they sing. Be critical of repertoire that enforces stereotypes about gender or sexuality.
- Δ **Be specific and honest with ensemble names.** Ensure that your ensemble names reflect who is actually welcome to participate in the ensemble. If "women's choir," consider what it would mean for a woman who sings tenor or bass to join your choir. If your women's choir sings only SSAA music or is only open to sopranos and altos, consider "treble choir," which is more specific and honest.

## COMMON CHALLENGES TO SUPPORTING LGBTQ+ SINGERS

I want to do more to support my LGBTQ+ singers but I'm worried about getting pushback from my administrators/parents/other students/board of directors, etc.

There are risks in supporting LGBTQ+ people in any environment, however data shows that knowing just one supportive adult in a school setting can significantly reduce suicidality for LGBTQ+ youth. (GLSEN, 2017)

It's useful to think about this challenge in terms of harm vs. discomfort. Some people may feel discomfort supporting queer people, especially if they have few close personal relationships with LGBTQ+ people. However, LGBTQ+ people (especially young people) experience lasting and demonstrable harm from remaining in environments with cultures of homophobia, transphobia, biphobia, etc.

For many queer young people, these unhealthy environments can be the root cause of mental health outcomes such as anxiety, depression, and can be significant barriers to success and health.

I want to show my support to my LGBTQ+ singers but I'm afraid of saying the wrong thing.

Have grace with yourself and trust that supporting your singers is the right thing to do. Trying and using new language can be scary, but can only improve with practice.

## I don't have any LGBTQ+ singers but when I do I will definitely support them!

It's impossible to tell someone's gender or sexuality by looking at them, so many conductors/educators don't know that they actually *do* have LGBTQ+ singers who are in the closet to some degree.

Maybe even more importantly, changing cultures to be more affirming of LGBTQ+ singers takes time, and can/should begin before there are even LGBTQ+ people in the room. If a trans singer joined your rehearsal *today* would they have the support from you and the ensemble they would need to feel safe?
